Cracking a Tough Nut

A message to the PCUSA from the GA Moderator

ATLANTA — Evangelism continues to be a really tough nut to crack for many Presbyterians. We worry about our shrinking churches, but we are not comfortable, by and large, talking with people outside the church (or sometimes inside it!) about our faith.

What can we do to help change this culture of silence into one that connects with people who need to hear good news? Here are a few suggestions I have picked up around the church.

Spring has finally sprung on us – I think – and with it come opportunities to get involved in a variety of activities inaccessible to us during the long winter – working in a garden or mowing a lawn, running or exercising, playing a spring sport or chasing that little white

ball, enjoying a deck or backyard, and so on. In some cases these will replace typical winter activities, in other cases they will simply be added to activities in which we are already involved. Either way, these will keep us busy – as if we needed to be more busy. Being busy is something we all complain about, some of us regularly. But being busy is a choice,

us get over our evangelistic lockjaw.

- Carry a give-away Bible.
- Buy several small, inexpensive Bibles or Scripture portions and mark with a highlighter some passages that are particularly powerful for you in terms of the gospel message. Carry one of these around with you in your car, purse, or in your carry-on bag when you fly. If you get into a religious discussion, give the person the Bible with your blessing and invite them to read the marked

- Expect it to happen. Pay attention and be prepared to respond graciously and authentically. There really are people out there who are desperate to hear some good news about themselves and the

world. We have that good news! If we are willing, God will use us to plant seeds of the gospel in people's lives.

A Note about HIPPA from Our Stated Clerk

The HIPPA Privacy Rules enacted by the government several years ago are confusing to many.

This is especially so for churches as finding out about and caring for its hospitalized members has become difficult as hospitals and other care facilities have tried to follow what was understood to be the rule.

In an edition of *Church Law and Tax Update*, Richard Hammar offers this short "True/False" quiz with the most common concerns or misconceptions.

- 1) The HIPPA privacy rules apply to every church.
- 2) A church has established a cafeteria plan allowing employees to pay for medical expenses with pre-tax dollars through salary reductions. The church is subject to the HIPPA Privacy Rule.
- 3) Hospitals may compile a patient directory that includes the names, room numbers, general condition, and religious affiliation, and make the directory available to members of the clergy.
- 4) A pastor asks a member of his church who is a nurse at a local hospital to forward

to him the name, room number, and medical condition of any new patient whose religious affiliation is listed as "Baptist" in the patient directory compiled by the hospital. Any compliance with this request by the hospital would violate HIPPA.

- 5) A weekly church bulletin lists the names of church members who are hospitalized. This practice violates the HIPPA Privacy Rule.

THE BOARD OF PENSIONS LAUNCHES NEW WEB SITE

The Board of Pensions of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) has launched its new Web site, www.pensions.org. This new site offers increased functionality, expanded information, and intuitive navigation, creating an improved online experience.

A highlight of the new site is BenefitsConnect, an online tool that provides non-retired members who are currently enrolled in a benefit secure access to their personal and plan benefits information. Not only can members review their personal and benefit information, but they can also submit changes to their contact information and dependent status. BenefitsConnect also features online calculators that members can utilize to estimate their pension and death benefits. This tool makes it easier than ever for members to keep track of their benefits.

Members will also find a plethora of new information, making it the "go to" source for details on the plans, programs, and services the Board offers. Although the Member Services team continues to be available, members will find that in most cases, they can quickly find the details they are looking for on the new Web site. This self-service site makes

locating information and resources fast and simple.

The new look of the site makes navigating the site clearer than ever. Organized to be audience specific, Plan members, church treasurers, business administrators, and middle governing bodies will find it easy to locate the information they require. Logical categories guide members to specialized educational information and resources. For example, the new Life Stages & Events section breaks the information up based on various life circumstances.

PENSION BOARD OKAYS 3.8% 'EXPERIENCE APPORTIONMENT'

The PCUSA Board of Pensions (BOP) delivered some good news to plan members despite currently iffy financial markets — an “experience apportionment” of 3.8%, effective July 1, 2008.

Accordingly, retired plan members will receive a 3.8% boost in their pensions and active plan members will receive a 3.8% increase in their pension credits.

At its March 6-8 meeting here, the board also voted to increase the disability benefit by 4%. There are currently just under 350 disabled members in the BOP's benefits plan.

The apportionments are calculated each year on the basis of a formula that takes into account the pension fund balance, projected assets and liabilities and stock

market performance of the BOP's nearly \$8 billion portfolio.

The BOP “balanced” portfolio returned 8.4% in 2007, according to vice-president for finance Mike Fallon, but is “down a little” so far this year.

Judy Freyer, the board's senior vice-president and chief investment officer, noted that the BOP has “no exposure to the sub-prime lending crisis” that is plaguing the U.S. economy.

In a meeting that was generally quiet, other BOP officials reported enrollment increases in several board programs, including the Affiliated Benefits Program — which offers healthcare, death and disability benefits but not pension coverage to ministers not serving in installed positions and lay church employees, and the optional dental coverage program.

With 3% growth in 2007 in the optional dental plan — currently through Aetna — Stewart Beltz, the BOP's director of welfare benefits design and funding, told the board's Healthcare Committee that a study has begun to explore a BOP self-insured dental insurance program rather than participation in the Aetna program.

Linda Wilder, chair of the Healthcare Committee told the board that “the financial condition [of the BOP's medi-

cal plan] is excellent right now and looks like it will be into 2009." However, she added, "It's always unpredictable.

John Cookson, the board's longtime medical actuarial, told the Healthcare Committee that "best estimate" projections show medical plan reserves gradually declining over the next three years but still within the BOP's target range.

BOP dues are currently 31.5% of "effective salary" — 19.5% for health care and 12% for pension, death and disability.

KIRKPATRICK TO SERVE AS VISITING PROFESSOR AT LOUISVILLE

Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary has announced the appointment of the Rev. Clifton Kirkpatrick as visiting professor of ecumeni-

cal studies and global ministries, beginning next fall.

The announcement was made during the "Voices of the Church Dinner," which was held March 4 in conjunction with Louisville Seminary's annual Festival of Theology and Alum Reunion. Kirkpatrick was the guest speaker.

Kirkpatrick is currently stated clerk of the General Assembly of the PCUSA. He is also president of the World Alliance of Reformed Churches and serves on the governing boards of the National Council of Churches of Christ in the U.S.A., and the Council of Presidents, United States Chapter, of the World Conference on Religion and Peace.


Last September, Kirkpatrick announced that he would not seek a fourth three-year term as stated clerk of the 2.3-million-member PCUSA. In a published statement addressed to friends and col-

leagues, he cited a desire for "more quality time with my family, to be able to devote myself more fully to the responsibility I have undertaken since 2004 to serve as president of the World Alliance of Reformed Churches, and to share in the life of the church, both locally and globally, in new and creative ways."

Kirkpatrick's time as stated clerk will conclude at the end of the 218th GA (2008) in San Jose, Calif., in June. He was first elected to the office in 1996 and is only the second GA stated clerk elected since Presbyterian reunion in 1983.

At Louisville Seminary, Kirkpatrick will teach up to two courses per year in areas of his expertise, including the ecumenical church, Presbyterian studies, the global church, Presbyterian polity and governance, con-

‘SOUPER BOWL’ SCORES RECORD \$9.5 MILLION

Souper Bowl of Caring officials say Presbyterian churches collected more than \$1 million in last month’s annual anti-hunger campaign.

As of March 5, organizers say, 2,356 Presbyterian

churches nationwide had raised \$1,001,523 — and collections haven’t been fully reported. The total marks the second straight year that Presbyterian collections broke the \$1 million mark.

So far some 14,654 organizations and congregations from a variety of U.S. religious denominations have reported collecting a record \$9.5 million, according to Souper Bowl officials.

Donations from Presbyterians made up more than 11% of the total, the second most contributions behind the Roman Catholic Church. The PCUSA had the second-highest number of churches participating, behind the United Methodist Church.

The Souper Bowl program was inspired by a prayer the Rev. Brad Smith offered at Spring Valley Presbyterian Church in Columbia, S.C., on Super Bowl Sunday in 1988.

Since then the campaign has raised nearly \$50 million for charities like food banks and soup kitchens. Participating groups phone in totals, then send donations to charities of their choice.

Last year more than 14,000 organizations and congregations raised \$8.1 million in all 50 states for the Souper Bowl of Caring. The total was up from \$5 million in 2006.

More than 2,450 Presbyterian congregations took part in Souper Bowl 2007, gener-

ating \$1.1 million. It was the first time that Presbyterian collections broke the \$1 million mark.

About 2,387 Presbyterian churches participated in Souper Bowl 2006, generating \$921,616.

So far this year’s top-contributing PCUSA congregations are Sunrise Presbyterian Church in Salina, Kan., with \$25,869, followed by Second Presbyterian Church in Indianapolis with \$24,483 and Memorial Drive Presbyterian Church in Houston, \$14,926.

In another phase of the Souper Bowl program, young people are urged to serve a charity in their community on Super Bowl weekend — a task that more than 12,000 youths performed this year, including 1,966 Presbyterian youth.

Overall, 277,678 youth participated in the 2008 Souper Bowl of Caring in some capacity, including 19,024 Presbyterian youth.

When Renovations Go Bad: Prepare for the Unexpected.

Renovation projects can be full of surprises. Some are welcome; many—such as discovering asbestos, lead paint, or mold—become unhappy discoveries. Surprises like these can drain a budget and seriously disrupt building plans.

With careful planning though, you can identify problem areas before you begin and minimize the cost and inconvenience of fixing them. The following tips will help avert some common renovation problems.

BRING IN PROFESSIONALS RIGHT FROM THE START

Long before you begin your project, hire an environmental inspector to perform a site survey and test for possible hazardous materials. This type of inspector has the ability to check for specific hazards that the naked eye can't see. He will take samples to test for lead paint and asbestos and will even bring in an X-ray machine to test for hidden mold. This inspector will

also test your soil, as well as the strength of your concrete and other building materials.

You should also bring in an architect or contractor who has expertise in renovations to perform his own study. This type of professional can identify any potential problem areas just from researching the materials that were popular during the year the structure was built. He can also find any out-of-date wiring or structural abnormalities such as a weak roof or hollow walls.

It is important that you call upon both types of professionals to assess your situation prior to beginning your renovation, as they perform separate but equally important functions.

PREPARE FINANCIALLY

Several years ago I was in charge of the construction team renovating and restoring St. Mary's Cathedral, built in the early 1900s as the archdiocese's showpiece in Miami, Fla. The day before we were to begin, a site inspection revealed that the cathedral's dome was infiltrated with asbestos. It was further discovered that some of the ceiling and bathroom tiles also contained asbestos. The repair costs for these items alone totaled approximately \$500,000.

This example illustrates why it is so critical to reserve

some money for any necessary but unplanned repairs. The bottom line is that you just don't know what issues will turn up, and being financially prepared will put you in a much stronger position to deal with the situation.

SPEND UP FRONT TO SAVE LATER

As expensive as the St. Mary's case may seem, it would have been a lot more so had the church administrators not done their due diligence beforehand. The cost to do the site assessments was minimal (approximately \$5,000) but saved the church a considerable amount of money. Because the asbestos was detected before construction on the dome began, we were able to keep that area within a contained environment so the rest of the church could still be used.

However, if we had already knocked down the ceiling in the dome for the renovation, asbestos particles would have been released into the air and the entire church would have had to be shut down. This would have crippled the church's ability to operate, creating a huge loss in revenue. In addition, the situation would have become an emergency case, resulting in a large expenditure due to people working around the clock to fix the problem.

The lesson here is that any upfront expense to identify potential problem areas is minimal compared to the expense of halting a project to contain the area and remove the problem.

NEGOTIATE THE FEES

If you are hiring an architect or contractor to oversee your job anyway, you can negotiate his survey fee into the total job cost. And, if it only requires a few hours of work, he might even forego the survey fee altogether in order to secure the entire job. Again, this really is a minimal upfront cost, but can result in huge savings down the road.

There is no guarantee that even a trained professional will identify every problem situation before-hand, but site surveys will minimize the unexpected and promote a smooth renovation process.

CROSS Ministries Update

In the beginning of March I asked the **Presbytery of Des Moines** office to send out an e-mail request for personal hygiene and cleaning items since our pantry shelves were growing quite bare. (See ad in left column.) The faith community came through for us and I am happy to report that we have been able to meet the needs of many more families than in previous months. We have also been able to provide larger quantities (e.g. an entire package of toilet tissue versus a roll or two). Another blessing that has occurred this month is that we have been accepted as a member of the Food Bank of Iowa. Although CROSS Ministries does not have a food pantry (only a personal hygiene pantry) we can purchase some dry goods, when available, for \$0.14 per pound. The items they have are random, but we recently purchased 13 cases of diapers, 4 cartons of deodorant, 1 carton of tub and tile cleaner, and 4 cartons of shampoo for a total of

\$48.16! The majority of our personal hygiene pantry items will continue to come from the faith community but what a blessing to be able to supplement our supplies with such reduced costs.

Now, with the onset of April, comes another challenge. The end of March brings an end to the Winter Moratorium Law that prevents utility companies from disconnecting the services of low-income households who have not been able to keep up with the high costs of heating. Most of the families who were protected by this law were in households that qualified under the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP). Still others were protected from utility disconnections during the winter months as a result of Iowa's cold weather rules that state that while temperatures remain 20 degrees Fahrenheit or colder, the utilities must be left on. With this year's exceptionally cold winter, utility company credit departments were at a stand-

still. As of April 2, all of that comes to an end as the disconnect notices go out to those who have been struggling the hardest.

While the majority of the households served by CROSS Ministries receive help with rent, deposits, or mortgage costs, April is a month in which utility concerns will be overwhelming. The extremely cold winter weather has brought higher utility bills at a time when many CROSS families are experiencing layoffs due to a slow economy. While some households will be able to establish utility payment arrangements, still others may not be eligible and will end up turning to social service programs, such as CROSS Ministries, for financial help.

During the next few critical months, please keep these families in your thoughts and prayers, as well as with CROSS Ministries, as we struggle to meet their most basic of survival needs.

Dear Covenant Friends,

Covenant Presbyterian Church in West Des Moines

has long taken the position of outreach to our community and especially to those who are most at risk. The current Head Start program, housed in our church building, provides an important support to families in need and children who might otherwise grow slower in their educational development. Research indicates at-risk children going through a Head Start program have decreases in grade retention and special education placement and measurable increased growth in social skills, emotional development and school achievements.

Following many meetings and discussions with Drake University's Head Start Director, Georgia Sheriff, and planning with church committees like Property and Christian Education, the Session voted at its March meeting to approve expansion of the Head Start program at Covenant Presbyterian Church to now include a toddler program.

From Drake's press release to be distributed soon, "The new classroom will help meet the high demand for child development programs for two-year olds on the west side of Polk County.

There will be morning and afternoon sessions offered year round...."

The class rooms for the Early Head Start Toddler program will be the currently unoccupied E-9 and E-10 in the building wing already housing Head Start. The wall dividing the two rooms will be removed, and capital investments of \$50,000 will be done such as adding a kitchenette, children's sinks, cabinetry, and possible replacement of egress windows in the room. Of significant importance will also be asbestos abatement of the floor and new flooring installed. In addition, this new program increases Covenant's cash flow up to \$7,000 annually.

The long-discussed use of the large room immediately off the sanctuary is now finalized to be a new church nursery where Early Head Start will install a bathroom with two stools for use by the EHS program during the week and the church's nursery use on Wednesday evenings, Sunday mornings and other occasions required by the church.

There is some cost to the church concerning the rearrangement of room use. The Session voted to provide up to \$5,000 for enhancements to the new nursery room which will include installation of an adult-size sink, asbes-

tos abatement of the floor, new flooring and any cabinetry needed. Having a child-friendly facility close to the sanctuary will be very supportive of young families and visitors who attend morning worship services or who participate in Wednesday evening programs.

Radon testing will be completed by the end of March, a sewer service study is being done and construction and timetables are being worked out for the summer. The issue of whether radon abatement of either the Head Start wing or the entire church structure is still to be decided by the Session following testing.

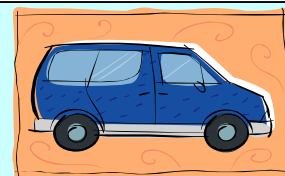
